Unit Title: Unit 1: Introducing Others and Talking About One's Self (Spanish II – Lessons 1, 2, 7 – mandatory)

Unit Summary: In this unit students will learn to introduce oneself and others. Students will learn to express greetings and relationships properly. Students will learn to describe things they own and show possession. They will also learn to express things they need, things they love, and things they dislike. Students will learn to ask others what they are doing and respond to the same questions.

Unit Rationale: This unit is designed to teach students how to communicate with others about things that they do, own, like, and dislike. Students will also learn to ask questions to others and respond to questions asked by others.
